


More generally, how and when does Lois in the North one proceed when teaching the Beach Library * tragedies of human history (WWII,

Some adults house wounded children, but all of us have an inner child we must protect from what we feed ourselves, physically, emotionally, and spiritually.

In this age of instant and oh so transparent communication, care must be given to what we send on and what we take in. Patricia and I screen movies, TV news and shows, and books very carefully before we invest our time and general mental health in what we watch or read. Our time and well-being are most valuable.

Some of the harshest words in the New Testament from Jesus were reserved for those who scandalize (or abuse) children: "If anyone causes one of these little ones to stumble, it would be better for them if a large millstone were hung around their neck and they were thrown into the sea." (Mark 9:42) Then again there are the Eight Beatitudes which extol the pure of heart, the peacemakers, the meek, the merciful, and the pure child within.

Soon after this writing and seeking permission to share

this first story, our daughter told us she contacted the principal, who spoke to the substitute. The latter expressed extreme remorse in an admitted error of judgement, and the principal sent Lois a beautiful personalized <u>presentation/letter</u> reassuring her that she would always be loved and protected from the upsetting news around her. It was a teachable moment for all.
